ZILLENNIALS, REALS, and SOGI's: Deviant worldview in the lives of teens

Just over a century ago, sociologist William Sumner defined deviancy as "abandonment of "folkways, mores, or codified law." Writing in 1906, Sumner's observations about whether people embrace cultural norms or reject them – whether individuals assimilate into polite society or defy it – could have been written about the clashes of our day.

Deviance against "folkways" or "mores" that came before may at first appear to have only minor consequences. But rejection of enough boundaries over a long enough period of time leads societies to a point that crime becomes the norm over laws and basic codes of conduct. Such are the results of deviancy unchecked.

The Great Commission in a time of cultural deviancy

Teens today (even those raised in a Christian environment) are rapidly abandoning values unquestioned in previous generations. Though about 51% of youth ages 13-19 identify as Christian, at best about 8% affirm beliefs and behaviors consistent with traditional, Biblical faith. ¹

Since COVID, teens indicating they have no religious faith has grown from 24% to 32%. 61% of teens now say, "It is not necessary to believe in God to be moral and have good values. Only 38% affirm that it is necessary to believe in God to be moral. ²

A 2022 survey cited 58% of U.S. teens stating, "I don't like to be told answers about faith and religion, I'd rather discover my own answers." ³ Even teens coming from a Christian background – some 45% – say that, "many religions may be true." 4

Nowhere has the drift toward deviancy been more vividly seen than in the "mainstreaming" of homosexuality and transgenderism. Homosexual attraction and/or true gender confusion occurs in only 2% of the population, yet teens are taught in public schools that. "homosexuality is normal and healthy." 5

taken place alongside decades of rampant divorce, and the glamorization of promiscuity in media and entertainment. Wave after wave of American teens indicating less and less support for Biblical perspectives is sad, but not surprising.

The Great Commission in a time of cultural fragmentation

It was as millennials came of age (around year 2000) that an undeniable loss of Christian commitment among America's youth became identifiable. Coming after millennials were kids raised in the most fragmented America yet, "GenZ".

"GenZ" / "Zillenials" – the most racially diverse people group in U.S. History – are projected to be the majority demographic by 2026. They are also the least religious demographic in US history. Many experts believe these religiously "disaffiliated" Americans will never be assimilated into what we traditionally call church. ⁶

Common attitudes of young adults without a Biblical foundation

Youth are growing up amid a crisis of truth, a crisis of identity, and an absence of context.

There is ambivalence (or distrust) toward history, and absence of moral and spiritual grounding known to previous generations. Teens frequently feel anxious, resentful, and alienated. Impersonal government (rather than family, church, or neighbors) is expected to ensure solutions, security, and fairness for all.

Such summations – while generally accurate – can prompt angry push-back from teens themselves: They are hurt and feel misunderstood by adults who "don't care." Yet at the same time feel invaded and "labeled" when adults accurately assess them.

Adolescence is emotionally and psychologically volatile for most everyone. That is why a Biblical worldview is so important: It provides a stable sense of *self* and *life context*. Without God's foundational truths on which to stand, many teens today live with inner turmoil: They are fearful at not being a part of a group, yet resentful in being "lumped in" with a group.

Another factor that has contributed to the fragmentation of our nation is "identity politics." A product of the pro-tribal messaging of leftist media and progressive public education, growing numbers of young adults identify themselves as REAL's. These are politically engaged, activist minded teens not identifying themselves by gender, and certainly not by American citizenship. They see their person-hood in terms of race, ethnicity, ancestry, or language. The REAL's views about morals, truth, and personal accountability are generally counter to Christianity.

But absent the holistic touch of Jesus Christ in their lives, teens are more fragmented – we might say, more broken – than ever. They are confused about themselves, desiring to be empathetic to fellow strugglers, lonely, yet fearful of relationships: Sociologists call many of them "SOGIE's" (meaning, they struggle with sexual orientation, gender identity or expression).

This generation, like our nation, urgently needs the Gospel. Therein lies opportunity.

Your enlistment in a "little platoon" that influences youth

Chuck Colson (1931-2012) was decades ahead of most leaders in discerning that America and the West is deeply embroiled in a struggle over worldviews. Quoting the Irish-born philosopher Edmund Burke (1729-1797), Colson would challenge believers not to underestimate the good each of us can do in our "little platoons."

Within our families, churches, and communities, people of all ages are poised to be used by God. It is time we see ourselves as soldiers of the Cross, ready to make a difference alongside the "little platoon" in which we have been providentially placed.

Realistic ways we may position ourselves to lead teens to a Biblical view of life:

- **CHURCH:** Participate in a solidly-Biblical church that makes a priority of outreach to youth.
- **PARENTING:** Consistently role model Christianity and prayerfully do your utmost to "pass the baton" of faith to your children.
- **MENTORING:** Become a tutor, volunteer in the schools, seek out local ministries in which to assist. **Continued on Page 6...**

- **PEER-TO-PEER IMPACT:** Youth can organize a Christian worldview club and lead their friends to Christ. Visit www.ViralTruth.com to learn more.
- CIVIC INVOLVEMENT: Attend school board meetings; Better yet, run for school board or city council. Look for ways in which you, as a Christian citizen, can get involved in the affairs of your town.



God explained it like pruning to me. If you let Him prune you like a tree of unfruitful things your life will produce much more fruit in what remains. You will have more energy for more love, more joy and more peace. More faithfulness, more patience, more gentleness, more goodness.

On the other side of letting go is a full life. Don't mourn the pruned branches, because they are leaving you so that you will bear more fruit. Indeed, when we are focused on the branches we are not focused on the Vine. But if you can get your focus off the branches and onto their source, you will find your connection to the True Vine more vital and life changing. I hope you can hang on to life and let go of death in your life, friend.

This revelation has changed me and allowed me to live with more grace. Today I am not giving an example of a friend changed by this advice, but myself. I have found the importance of letting go is essential to holding on to the one thing that matters most: Jesus. And full circle now, in Him is everything we've ever longed for. I hope this encourages you and helps with what you are facing today.

You Will Arrive!

One evening, I was studying the book of Exodus and came across the part of scripture that talks about some members of Israel who died in the wilderness, and I heard the Holy Spirit say to me, "EVERYONE who left Egypt, God intended to bring to the promised land – EVERYONE." It was as though the Holy Spirit was defending God as blameless against those who died in the wilderness. EVERYONE was supposed to arrive, and within a short time too. Those who died in the wilderness were disobedient, and this was due to their impatience. They felt the journey was too long, and rebelled against Moses' instruction. When they faced hardship, they grumbled and looked back, lusting for the food in Egypt. They were not willing to fight for what God had promised. All they were supposed to do was move in the direction of the Holy Spirit, and no matter what they faced, reaching their destination was guaranteed. They chose the convenience of being subject to their oppressors, instead of believing God and fighting their way to victory, and many of them died in their unbelief. Yet, God was still committed to His promise to Abraham.

Many years later on the journey, Moses and Aaron died after playing their role. But before Moses died, God told him to pass the torch to Joshua, and gave Joshua everything he needed to continue the journey. Joshua excelled in his position as Israel's leader, even though he faced overwhelming challenges and setbacks. But by the time Joshua was at an old age, so much was still outstanding. In Joshua chapter 13:1-6, God says something to Joshua, which everyone who has a promise from God should keep in mind.

I When Joshua had grown old, the Lord said to him, "You are now very old, and there are still very large areas of land to be taken over. 2 "This is the land that remains: all the regions of the Philistines and Geshurites, 3 from the Shihor River on the east of Egypt to the territory of Ekron on the north, all of it counted as Canaanite though held by the five Philistine rulers in Gaza, Ashdod, Ashkelon, Gath and Ekron; the territory of the Avvites 4 on the south; all the land of the Canaanites, from Arah of the Sidonians as far as Aphek and the border of the Amorites; 5 the area of Byblos; and all Lebanon to the east, from Baal Gad below Mount Hermon to Lebo Hamath.

The sentence in red is for emphasis. In paraphrase, God was saying; "Joshua, I see you are old and too weak to continue this journey. You may be done, but I am not

done. I made a promise and I am determined to fulfill it, no matter how long it takes. All the lands I promised must be taken." But God doesn't stop there; He names all the lands yet to be taken. Think about it! He knows what He promised and has the details at the tip of His hands. In the backdrop of this scripture, I can boldly say that every promise God has made to us, He will fulfill, even if we forget. We do not have to worry about remembering all His promises – they are too many. But we should rather have faith in Him, and patiently wait for the fulfillment of His promise – "I am the Lord, When the time is right, I will make these things happen quickly." Isaiah 60:22. God truly makes all things beautiful in its time. It is noteworthy that even though God uses people as a vessel to bring about His promise, the end of that vessel is not the death of His promise. He moves!

CALL TO ACTION

If you have left your Egypt, please don't die in the wilderness. Don't look back. Don't get stuck. The journey will be tough and rough. It's part of the process. Embracing this mindset – that difficulties and troubles are integral to the path toward your promise – can make the journey easier. God didn't take Israel through the short route, knowing they would encounter challenges that might tempt them to turn back. Instead, He guided them through the wilderness, a longer path. This long route didn't eliminate troubles but made the distance to return too great, strengthening their resolve to keep moving forward, and forcing them to fight for a win. Short cuts are not always the best paths. It's easier to give up in the face of trouble when the path you're traveling on is short. But God is committed to fulfilling His promise to you by leading you on the right path. You will not know how or when, and you'll need to be patient. Hebrews 6 verse 12 says, "they obtained the promise through faith and patience." If all that you can do is crawl, keep on moving. You will arrive!
