#### What is Pentecost? BY JAVAN SMITH

Fifty days after Passover, is the biblical feast known as Shavuot (the Feast of Weeks). Through Church history, Shavuot has commonly been called "Pentecost," a name derived from the Greek word for "fiftieth." Because most of the world follows the Gregorian calendar, rather than the lunar Hebrew calendar, churches observe "Pentecost Sunday" on a day that may not correspond with the biblical Feast of Shavuot, but regardless of what some scholars may argue, Pentecost and Shavuot are the same holiday. During 2024, "Pentecost Sunday" was observed on May 19, but according to the Hebrew calendar, the holiday should fall on June 11-13. Calendar discrepancies notwithstanding, the meaning of the Feast is far more important than the actual date of observance.

Of the seven feasts of Israel, Pentecost is the final spring feast. Four feasts occur during the Spring and three occur during the Fall. When studied as a complete panorama, the seven feasts tell the story of the betrothal and marriage of the Messiah with His Bride. In the four spring feasts, we see a portrayal of the betrothal or 'kiddushin.' At the betrothal stage, the bridegroom offers the cup of wine to his beloved, and she has the choice of whether to accept. Once she accepts, then the marriage contract, known as the 'ketubah' is drawn up, specifying the bride price, or "mohar." Yeshua the Messiah fulfilled the four spring feasts in His first coming, when He came as the suffering servant. In the first Pentecost that followed His crucifixion, Jesus sent the bride price ("mohar") of the

Holy Spirit, whom Ephesians 1:13-14 refers to as the down payment of our promised redemption. Continued on Page 2...

### What is Pentecost?

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During Passover, the Lord offered the cup of wine, revealing His intent to betroth us to Himself. Recall that the very first Passover was the night that the Lord led the armies of Israel out of Egypt. Most scholars believe that the Law was given at Mt. Sinai fifty days after the very first Passover, which would have been the very first Feast of Shavuot. In a sense, the Law represented the marriage contract (the ketubah) between the Lord and His Bride. Of course, Israel broke the marriage contract (see Jeremiah 31:32), but when Jesus came, He paid the price of the broken contract. In fact, when He was in the wilderness, He responded to each temptation by saying "it is written." The Hebrew word for "marriage contract" ("ketubah") literally means "written." Though the New Testament is recorded in Greek, Jesus would have spoken Aramaic or Hebrew, and the word that He would have used to say "it is remain about the written" would have been a direct reference to the marriage King's business contract that was given at the first Shavuot, namely the Law. Even though the bride had broken the contract, the Bridegroom came to keep that which had been "written."


Pentecost represents a season of waiting. After Passover, the people of God are to count fifty days, from barley harvest to wheat harvest. Recall that the Holy Spirit be fulfilled came "when the Day of Pentecost had fully come," according to Acts 2:1-4. Why did it happen when Pentecost reason why we are had fully come? Fulfillment of the Promise had to happen on the fiftieth day, corresponding to the time frame God had prearranged millennia earlier. Between the Resurrection and the promised outpouring of the Holy Spirit, what did Jesus instruct His disciples to do? He told them to wait! (see Luke 24:49). Sometimes, waiting can seem maddening, but we know that He is working in the waiting.

Befitting to the theme of waiting, the story of Ruth is generally associated with the holiday of Shavuot. Orthodox Jews traditionally read the Book of Ruth during the Shavuot season. Ruth's redemptive story is a story of waiting, trusting that her redeemer was working on her behalf. From the time of barley harvest, corresponding to Passover, to the time of wheat harvest, corresponding to Pentecost, Ruth patiently continued to glean in the field of Boaz. After waiting for nearly seven weeks, she received an instruction from her mother-in-law, Naomi. What was that instruction? Essentially, Naomi instructed her to wait some more! In Ruth 3:18, Naomi told Ruth, "Sit still, my daughter until you know how the matter will turn out; for

the man will not rest until he has concluded the matter this day." Meanwhile, while Ruth waited, Boaz was acting as her kinsman-redeemer, working out the details of her redemption!

And so, as Pentecost season is upon us, we are

reminded that we are in a time of waiting. Our season of waiting is not a time to sit idle, just as Ruth continued to serve in the field while she waited. Likewise, we while we await the return of our Redeemer. The three fall feasts which are yet to remind us of the waiting. During



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namely the Feast of Trumpets, the Day of Atonement, and the Feast of Tabernacles, we look ahead to the wedding phase of our marriage to the Messiah, known in Hebrew as the "nissuin." One day the trumpet will sound, and He will carry away His Bride to dwell with Him in His Tabernacle! For this reason, the Fall Feasts symbolize the phase of when He will marry us once and for all and carry us away to abide with Him eternally. The etymology of the 'nissuin" phase comes from a Hebrew word meaning to "lift away" or to "carry away." Praise the Lord!

So let us wait for Him, and let us be about the King's business as we wait. Whether you observe Pentecost according to the Gregorian calendar or the Hebrew calendar, or whether you have never observed the feast at all, remember to thank Him for the marriage contract that He upheld for you and the down payment of the Holy Spirit that He gave to you as a bride price. Most importantly, remember to look up, for your redemption draws nigh!

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### Exploring Passover: A Journey of Learning and Celebration

As with the fall feasts I have felt drawn to learn about the spring feasts that are significant in Jewish culture. The timing of these feasts, along with other events happening globally and in the sky, made me even more curious. Just like we did with the fall feasts, we invited some friends to join us in celebrating, and it's been an amazing experience. In the upcoming articles, I'll share what we've learned.

We kicked off our Passover celebration with a traditional Seder. Together, we loved going through the Haggadah, a guidebook that walks you through prayers, blessings, and the story of Passover, including the symbolism of the items on the Seder plate. All of this comes from a command in Exodus 12 to observe the feast for generations to come. About 25 people of all ages came to our home to share in the Passover Seder. We all had a great time learning, trying traditional foods, and remembering the goodness and power of our God together. It was so special that we decided to make it an annual tradition for our families. Here are some things we learned.

At its core, Passover commemorates the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt, as described in the book of Exodus. God, through Moses,

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intervened dramatically, inflicting ten plagues upon Egypt, culminating in the death of the firstborn, while sparing the Israelites who had marked their doorposts with the blood of a sacrificial lamb. This act of deliverance marked the beginning of a new chapter for the Israelites, as they embarked on a journey toward the Promised Land.

For Christians, Passover holds great significance, particularly in understanding the sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. ### **New City Council Shows Its True Face**

On May 16, 2024, the Woodland Park City Council met for a special session at 5:30 p.m. to interview the four candidates that had applied for the last remaining City Council seat vacated by newly elected mayor Kellie Case. The council asked different questions to every candidate. The four applicants were Carrol Harvey former council member that resigned in 2019 and then was appointed to fill a vacant seat in May 2023 but did not run for reelection, Don Dezellem - conservative candidate and long time resident who received 1,087 votes on April 2nd, Donald A. Hoying - member of the planning commission, and Eric Lockman - conservative candidate who received 1,129 votes on April 2nd.

Several public speakers including the three Teller County Commissioners had urged the council in previous meetings that the council is under an obligation to do the "right thing" for the City of Woodland Park, that they now have to listen to their citizens, especially the ones that did not vote for them, and strive to be representatives for all in an attempt to unify the town. After all, the whole reason for the vacant council seat is the recent election with a record voter turnout, the highest form of democratic participation. Four unsuccessful conservative

candidates each received around 40% of the votes and these citizens' votes should count. One public speaker reminded the council that Carrol Harvey had lost the privilege to be on the council by her past resignation and her refusal to run for reelection in April.

However, all this was to no avail. As many had already predicted, the whole exercise appeared to be more show than earnest and Carrol Harvey was elected to the council with 5 out of 6 votes, while George Jones voted for his planning commission colleague Donald Hoying. To top it off, George Jones later tried to justify the decision of the council by stating that they had received 10 written endorsements for Carrol Harvey, but none for the other candidates. 40% of the votes in an election apparently do not count.

The remainder of the session was dominated by the budget presentation by the School Board. After board president Mick Bates and superintendent Witt presented the planned allocation of the 1.09% sales tax that the city collects for the school district, the council members ceased the opportunity to let their frustration out on the school district's leadership using the supposedly insufficient **Continued on Page 10...** 


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# Transgender-ism in Woodland Park Schools – Mandated by Denver


On April 29, 2024, Governor Jared Polis signed House Bill 1039 into law concerning non-legal name changes for students in schools. The new bill mandates all public and charter schools to use a student's preferred name if requested by the student. The so called "chosen name" refers to any name differing from a student's legal name reflecting their gender identity, and "gender identity" is again defined as an individual's (i.e. the child's) inherent sense of their gender, regardless of their biological sex. The bill also established a specific task force which will oversee and enforce the implementation of the new law by local school districts. According to the bill, the refusal of a school to use a student's chosen name will be deemed a form of discrimination. Schools must put the new law into action and have a written policy in place by July 1, 2026.

The implementation of HB1039 was discussed at the Woodland Park School Board meeting on May 8. 2024. During the meeting, the board discussed and ultimately passed a directive to superintendent Witt to draft a corresponding policy for the Woodland Park school district. During the discussion, president Mick Bates stressed that parental rights cannot be violated and that parents should always be informed about their child's wish for a name change. He also stated that the policy should include a rule giving the school the right to deny any disingenuous name changes. David Rusterholtz was the only board member who passionately opposed the law and spoke up against it, saying that it was a bad law that undermined the family, something we should not have to tolerate. The law further violates the rights of parents and educators, and school employees to stand for what they believe. However, the resolution passed, signaling the board's agreement to comply with HB1039, and ordering superintendent Witt to draft the administrative policy, which will then again be brought in front of the school board.

And just like that, our representatives in Denver have managed to forcefully introduce transgender-ism into our local public schools and charter schools, a place that should be dedicated to education, math, reading, and writing, not indoctrination on social issues. But instead of just pointing the finger at Denver, we have to ask ourselves: how did this happen? Where was the church? Where were the parents of Colorado? Where was I?

At Wednesday's school board meeting, not even a handful conservative citizens showed up. Apart from that, the room was filled again with opponents of the conservative school board who – as usual – did not hold back from letting their frustration and opinions known during public comment. How was your voice heard? As Christians, citizens, parents, we have a responsibility to hold our elected officials accountable, to speak up, to be engaged, and to stand for truth. The passing of HB1039 is the painful result of our inaction. While not everyone is called to run for an elected office, no-one is called to ignorance. Please prayerfully consider where you can make a difference in the future. Please consider attending our local government's school board and city council meetings, engage your church, and be a participating citizen. Let us be a light in this dark world.


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
